LIQUID GENDER

17 February - 4 August 2024



Liquid Gender explores the relationship between identity and culture, asking how do we know who we really are?

Featuring the photography, collage, sculptural work of Leilah Babirye, Martine Gutierrez, Laryssa Machada and Antônio Vital Neto Pankararu, the pressures of society are pushed aside and the true self is revealed.

The artists draw upon personal histories and

pre-colonial traditions from around the world to convey fluid approaches to gender expression and self-identity.

In spring, the exhibition will be added to with a new holographic sculpture titled In the Absence of Evidence, We Create Stories, from Rashaad Newsome. The sculpture will animate to visualise dialogues between objects in the Sainsbury Centre collection about their past, present and future.

JEFFREY GIBSON: NO SIMPLE WORD FOR TIME

24 February - 4 August 2024



In his first solo exhibition at a UK museum, American artist Jeffrey Gibson (b.1972) has created a new sitespecific installation for the Sainsbury Centre.

He is the first Indigenous artist to represent the USA at this year's Venice Biennale.

Incorporating murals, paintings, textiles and historical objects, Gibson includes text drawn lyrics, poetry, and his own writing, complete with references to abstraction, fashion and popular culture.

Nineteenth-and twentiethcentury objects from Indigenous cultures of North America selected by the internationally renowned artist, will be shown alongside his works.

IN EVENT OF MOON DISASTER

17 February - 4 August 2024



According to a YouGov poll, 16% of the British public believe that the 1969 Apollo 11 moon landing never happened.

In Event of Moon Disaster was the title of a speech prepared for President Nixon in case of a catastrophe. The speech was never delivered, but artists Halsey Burgund and Francesca Panetta have used deepfake technology to offer an alternative event, played on a vintage television.

Visitors become immersed in a 1960s living room in an experience which has the power to make audiences reconsider whether we can believe the media we consume.

The artists said: "By using the most advanced techniques available, creating a video using both synthetic visuals and synthetic audio (a "complete deepfake"), we aim to show where this technology is heading –

and what some of the key consequences might be."

In Event of Moon Disaster is an MIT Center for Advanced Virtuality Production. The work won an Emmy Award for Interactive Media Documentary in 2021.

THE CAMERA NEVER LIES: CHALLENGING IMAGES THROUGH THE INCITE PROJECT

18 May - 20 October 2024



Joining the Sainsbury
Centre's six-month long
investigation into *What Is Truth?* is an exhibition
re-evaluating the most iconic
images of the past 100 years. *The Camera Never Lies:*Challenging images through
The Incite Project explores
the impact and influence
photography has had on
shaping – and in some cases
distorting the narrative of
major global events.

Featuring more than 100 works by legendary photographers including Don McCullin (b.1935), Stuart Franklin (b.1956), Robert Capa (1913-1954) and Dorothea Lange (1895-1965), as well as modern practitioners, this extensive exhibition charts a global century of iconic documentation and manipulation.

Sometimes seen as superior to text, photographs are now a mainstay of how the media and the public consume events such as war, famine, and celebrity. But is what people see a true reflection of the reality?

Curated by Harriet Logan and Tristan Lund, the works in *The Camera Never Lies: Challenging images through The Incite Project* are drawn from The Incite Project, a private collection of photojournalism, documentary photography and photographic art.

From 16–18 May, Tania El Khoury's interactive sound installation *Memory of Birds* will be staged in the Sainsbury Centre Sculpture Park as part of the Norfolk & Norwich Festival. The work takes place in trees and is made in collaboration

Artist In Conversation: Rashaad Newsome and Dr Michael T. Stuart (York University). 29 May, 5–7pm

Artist Rashaad Newsome and Philosopher Dr. Michael T. Stuart will offer insight into their practices, reflecting on creative applications for artificial intelligence and ideas of authenticity.

This will be a collaborative event with the Sainsbury

Centre's Young Associates programme, showcasing the Young Associate's responses to Newsome's work and the topic of Al and creativity.

New Orleans-born Rashaad Newsome (b.1979), whose multi-disciplinary work explores Black and Queer space in art history, will present a new collection of collages that look to the cultural traditions of the past, the social complexities of the present, and the possibilities of the future.

Dr Michael Stuart is a Lecturer in Philosophy at the University of York, working on the epistemology and ethics of science. In particular, on scientific imagination, the aesthetics of science, and artificial intelligence.

Yuki Kihara is an interdisciplinary artist of Japanese and Sāmoan descent. Through a research-based approach, her work seeks to challenge dominant and singular historical narratives and its persistence in the sociopolitical climate through a wide range of mediums, including performance, sculpture, video, photography and curatorial practice.

Paradise Camp, an exhibition by Yuki Kihara premiered to great acclaim in the New Zealand Pavilion presented at the 59th Venice Biennale in 2022, will be exhibited at the Sainsbury Centre in 2025, in its first UK showing. This talk will cover Paradise Camp and its ongoing development, exploring the artist's intersectional themes such as gender, museum collections, climate change and colonisation.






